- Oct. 12 **Mail Registration:** Last day to postmark application for general election
- Oct. 17 and last day it must be received by board of elections is Oct 17. §5-210(3)
  
- Oct. 12 **In person registration:** Last day application must be received by board of election to be eligible to vote in general election. If you have been honorably discharged from the military or have become a naturalized citizen since October 12<sup>th</sup>, you may register in person at the board of elections up until October 27<sup>th</sup>. §§5-210, 5-211, 5-212
  
- Oct. 17 **Changes of address** received by this date must be processed. §5-208(3)
  
- Oct. 12 **Change of party enrollment.** Last day to accept a change of enrollment. §5-208(3)

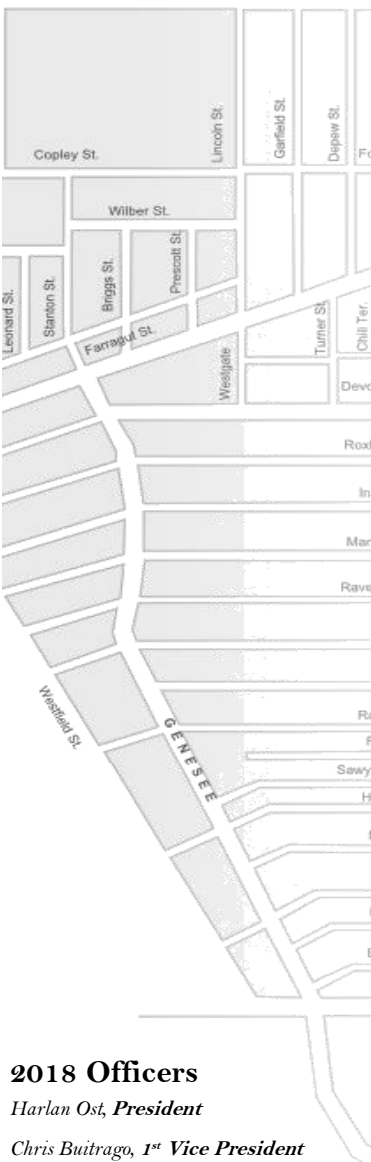

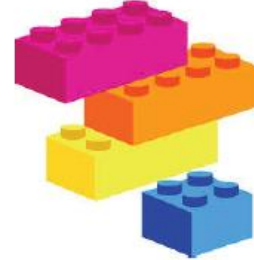

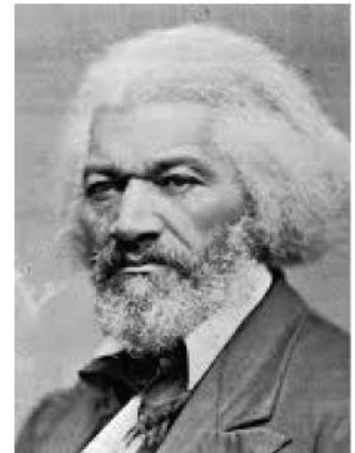


**Rochester Oratorio Society Commemorates

**What is FAFSA Fest?** FAFSA Fest is an annual series of events that will bring local volunteers to locations around the city to help students and families complete their FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) online, answer financial aid questions and provide individual counseling to understanding college costs. Food and refreshments may be provided, and there is no need to pre-register. Volunteers include financial aid counselors from local colleges, accountants and attorneys.

We are in the last 2 weeks of market season for 2018. Stop by the Westside Farmers Market on Tuesday. The harvest is amazing, and you can stock up for cold weather. ## Delegates' Council Meeting, Sept. 13, 2018

Harlan Ost, President, chaired the meeting

--**Arnett Library**, Bruce Tehan: TASC tutoring is ongoing, to help people prepare for the high school equivalency exam.

--Report from **Urban League**, Carolyn Vitale: Urban League of Rochester plans to apply for funding for a new construction project to build 45 single family homes in a rent to own program. The rent to own program is based on a successful model used by CHN Housing Partners, based in Cleveland. The program would be for households with income at or below 60% of area median income. Households would be responsible for general upkeep and minor repairs, and families would rent the units for about 15 years; at which point they could purchase the property. The monthly mortgage amount, including insurance and taxes, would be equal to the rent payment. The houses are designed to fit in with the neighborhood, with front porches. Most will have basements, and will be built with energy efficient materials, and some units will meet handicapped accessibility requirements. The plan is to build most of the houses in the southwest neighborhood. Carolyn distributed a list of possible sites. Urban League would appreciate a letter of support. Delegates will look into the proposal and discuss it again at October Delegates' meeting.

--**School Update**: Newly re-opened School 16 is holding an open house on Saturday, from 11 to 2pm, to showcase the beautiful renovations that are not completed. The school is also looking for volunteers. ALSO, RCSD has announced that School 44 will stay open. 19<sup>th</sup> WCA has promoted neighborhood schools for years, but NYS is not paying for short distance bussing. Sort distance bussing would benefit families and schools; talk to your NYS Senators and Assembly representatives.

--**Treasurer's Report** from Deb Wight: A written report was distributed, through June 30, 2018. Funds from Square fair are deposited and reconciled.

--**Summer activities**: Party at Ravenwood Garden was wonderful. Potluck Picnic was successful, but we had hoped for more participation. Play Rocs event for children was not well attended, but it was a great event for those who came. (Play Rocs event promote old-fashioned outdoor play.) Westside Market is sponsoring a health information night on Sept. 18--**Police accountability**: City Council has drafted legislation for a Police Accountability Board. There are some concerns with the draft: for example, the community is not given adequate representation on the board. The matter will be discussed at Sept 18 City Council meeting.

--**Public Safety Committee**: We need a chairperson. Interested members should talk with Harlan Ost.

-- **Upcoming events**: **Porch Fest** will be held on Sept. 23. **Citizen Merchant of Year** dinner will be held on Oct. 27.

months. The City has purchased many lots north of Main Street. Environmental testing is underway. See City's web site for more information. 250 people attended a community fair that was held at the Salvation Army parking lot on Sept 8; purpose was to bring people together to have fun and to learn about the development process.

--We applied to City for **the 2018-19 Street Manager project**, to continue to support businesses in the six business corridors of SW Rochester.

--**Annual convention** will be held **Nov.16 at School 16**, from 6 to 9pm. Members should bring a dish to pass or make a small donation for food. We will raffle off baskets. Our keynote speaker will be Richard Feldman, President of University of Rochester. We will elect officers at that meeting and potential officers are being recruited now. Contact Harlan Ost for more information.

--**IT help:** We need more consistent IT help with updates, website issues, virus protection, and general trouble shooting.

--**District meetings: Delegates** must hold District meetings in Sept or October for election of new delegates, or re-election of current delegates.

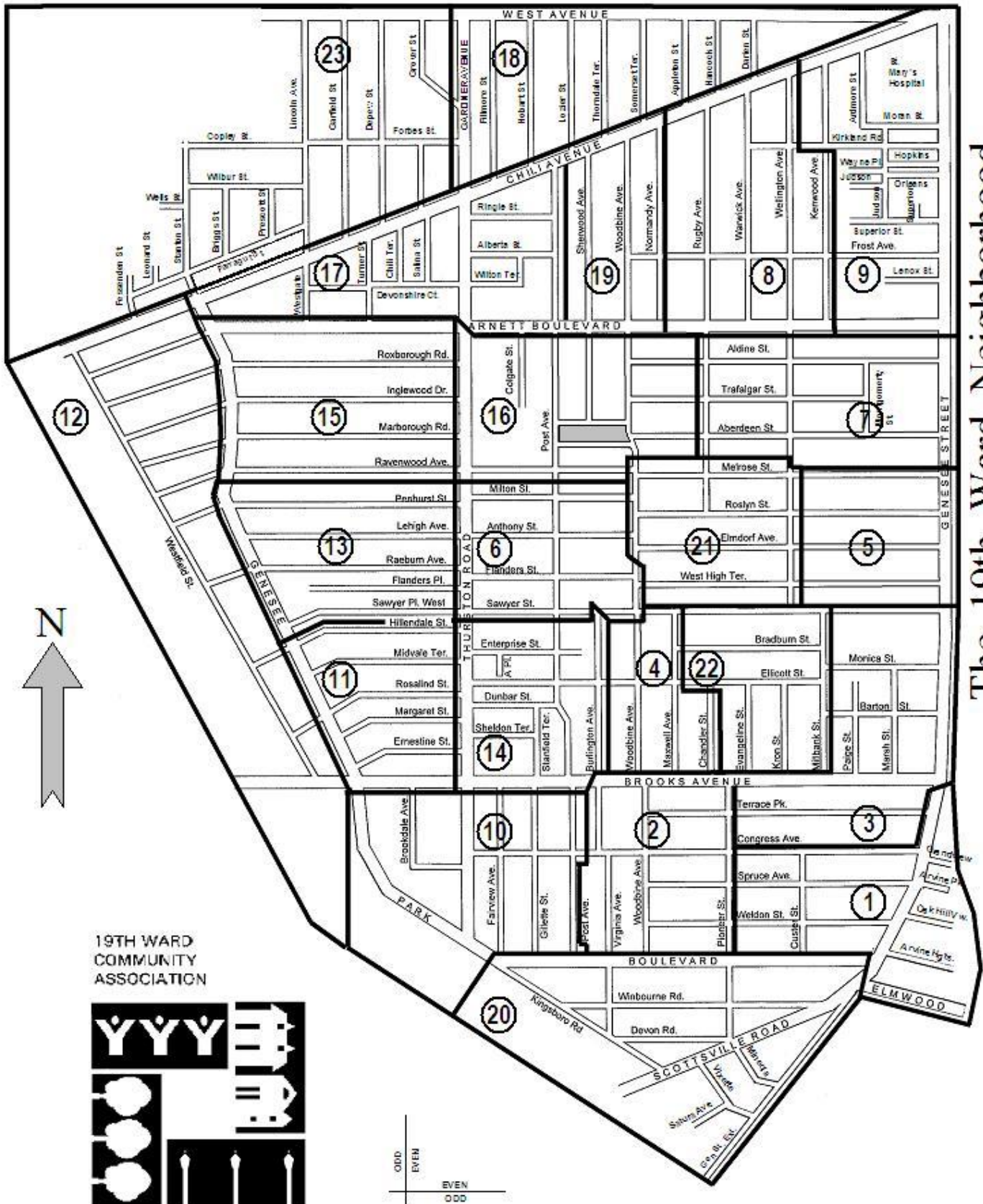

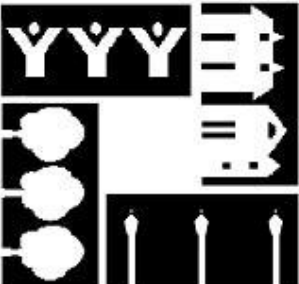
