



Abid holds a B.S. in Political Science from the Rochester Institute of Technology.

Iman will be speaking to us about some of the steps taken locally around the protection of our civil liberties, fighting for people's civil liberties locally, what issues we should be aware of, and how we can continually energize ourselves and others.


Purpose: Presentation of Final Design

LaShay Harris was present to give an updated report on Square Fair. The Square Fair committee had hoped to realize a goal of \$5000.00 income, and in fact they were successful in that goal.

House Tour - all pieces in place for the House Tour event on Saturday, 10/14. Jackie asked for 2 more volunteers to fill a void at one of the houses

Convention Update – date is Friday, Nov 17 at Danforth. Keynote speaker is Iman Ibad, Director NYCLU, Genesee Valley Chapter. 
Rather than putting the money in your basket, please give it to your organizer or to the SWEM representative.

Great things come from the most unlikely places

This is how many neighbors of the 19th Ward feel about their neighborhood

The pride of our homes and our Neighborhood was evident On October 14, as we hosted the 38th 19WCA House Tour. Our first tour took place in 1971, and in recent years we have been showcasing neighborhood homes every other year. This year there were eight homes plus a city school, the Dr. Walter Cooper Academy, on the tour. That Congress Avenue school celebrated its 100th year this year, having first opened its doors on Jan. 29, 1917.

Four of the homes were in the Sibley-Elmdorf Historic District, one of Rochester's newest historic districts. The Sibley Tract bears the name of a true Rochester pioneer, Hiram Sibley, who formed the Western Union Telegraph Company in 1856. His family began subdividing his estate lands in 1903. Virtually all the housing in Rochester's 19th Ward neighborhood was built during the years 1900 through 1930. The architectural styles in the Sibley Tract are interpretations of popular styles of the day, including Colonial Revival, American Foursquare, Arts and Crafts/Bungalow and Tudor Revival.

One of the homes on this year's tour had a famous first resident: Joseph C. Wilson, who was the Mayor of Rochester from 1927 to 1930. The Wilson family was the founder, in 1906, of the Haloid Company, renamed Xerox Corporation in 1961. Another home on the tour has a working honeybee hive in the dining room. The hive is connected to the outdoors with a pipe for the bees to come and go as they please. That home is owned by Sweet Bees, Inc, a nonprofit that promotes urban beekeeping.

Besides raising funds to support the work of the Association, another goal of the house tour is building and maintaining a strong community. With that in mind, Maria Furgiuele, Executive Director of the Community Design Center of Rochester, gave a talk about creating resilient neighborhoods. Following that, Dr. Walter Cooper, still very much involved with the school that bears his name, offered his insights on how schools and neighborhoods work together for the common good.

It was a wonderful event, on a beautiful October day. With approx. 150 people touring our tree lined streets and visiting the eight exceptional homes on tour. Just over half of the participants were from other neighborhoods. Meaning, our secrets of quality housing, and a strong, welcoming community are spreading!



- ☐ Proposal 1 would call for a constitutional convention to explore proposals for changes to the state constitution.
- ☐ Proposal 2 would allow judges to reduce or revoke the state pension of a public officer convicted of a felony related to his or her duties.
- ☐ Proposal 3 would create a 250-acre land bank, which would allow local governments to request forest preserve land for projects in exchange for the state acquiring 250 acres for the forest preserves.

New York Proposal 1, the Constitutional Convention Question, is on the ballot in New York as an automatic ballot referral on November 7, 2017.

A **"yes"** vote supports holding a constitutional convention to develop and propose changes to the state constitution that voters would vote on at the election on November 5, 2019.

A **"no"** vote opposes holding a constitutional convention to develop and propose changes to the state constitution that voters would vote on at the election on November 5, 2019.

A constitutional convention is a meeting of elected delegates who propose amendments to or rewrite the state constitution. Proposals developed at a convention are put on a ballot for voter consideration. New Yorkers voted on 12 constitutional convention questions during the 239 years between 1777 and 2016. In 2017—which is 240 years after the first constitution was ratified—citizens of the state are voting on the question for the 13th time. Of the 12 questions asked before 2017, seven resulted in constitutional conventions being held and four led to new state constitutions. Prior to 1900, four of five questions were approved. Between 1900 and 1999, three of seven questions were approved, representing a lower rate of approval compared to the previous century.^[1] As of October 18, 2017, polling indicated that a plurality of New Yorkers are interested in approving a constitutional convention question in 2017.

To simplify: Every 20 years New York State voters decide whether or not there should be a Constitutional Convention. If the majority of the voters vote YES, then next year we would elect the delegates to serve on the convention. The conven-

tion delegates would then go about the task of rewriting, updating, make additions and edits to our state constitution. Those changes would then be presented to the voters in 2019 as a referendum for adoption or rejection.

New York Proposal 2, the Pension Forfeiture for Convicted Officials Amendment, is on the ballot in New York as a legislatively referred constitutional amendment on November 7, 2017.^[1]

A **"yes"** vote supports this amendment to authorize judges to reduce or revoke the public pension of a public officer convicted of a felony related to his or her official duties.

A **"no"** vote opposes this amendment to authorize judges to reduce or revoke the public pension of a public officer convicted of a felony related to his or her official duties.

Proposal 2 would allow judges, following a court hearing, to reduce or revoke the public pension of a public officer convicted of a felony related to his or her official duties. Judges would consider the severity of the crime in determining whether to reduce or revoke the officer's public pension. They would also consider whether pension forfeiture would create undue hardship for the convicted officer's spouse, children, and other dependents. The measure would define *public officers* as elected officials, governor-appointed officials, municipal administrators and managers, heads of government departments, boards, and commissions, state and local chief fiscal officers and treasurers, judges and justices of the unified court system, and employees of the state designated as policymakers. Proposal 2 would apply to any crimes committed on or after January 1, 2018.^{[1][2]}

New York Proposal 3, the Forest Preserve Land Bank Amendment, is on the ballot in New York as a legislatively referred constitutional amendment on November 7, 2017.

A **"yes"** vote supports this amendment to: create a 250-acre land bank, which would allow local governments to request state Forest Preserve land for qualifying projects in exchange for the state adding 250 new acres to the preserve; and allow bike paths, sewer lines, and utility lines within the width of highways on preserve land.

A **"no"** vote opposes this amendment to: create a 250-acre state Forest Preserve land bank; and allow bike paths, sewer lines, and utility lines within the width of highways on preserve land.

Proposal 3 would create a forest preserve land bank of 250 acres for qualifying local projects. The land bank would be referred to in law as the *Health and Safety Land Account*. Municipalities would request to use acres in the land bank to address bridge and road hazards, water wells to meet drinking water standards, and stabilizing public utility lines. Before local governments could begin requesting acres in the land bank, the state would acquire 250 new acres to include in the Forest Preserve. The measure would also allow bike paths, sewer lines, and electric, telephone, and broadband lines within the width of highways (49.5 feet or the width of the easement in existence on July 1, 2015) cutting through the Forest Preserve.^{[1][2]}


