

Zola Brown Leader, Organizer, and Activist for Social and Economic Justice, is currently Second Vice-President on the 19th Ward Community Association board of directors. Her tireless efforts to work for her community include Chairperson of the Square Fair Parade, the Square Fair Planning Committee and she chairs the annual Martin Luther King Celebration each January.

Zola's commitment to her community, her city, and state includes participating as an Executive Board Member and V.P. of the 1199SEIU United Health Workers East, Executive V.P. of the Rochester chapter of the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists, Executive V.P. of the Rochester Chapter of the Black Trade Unionists (CBTU), CBTU Region One Women's Committee Chair and National Vice Chair & advisor to the Puerto Rican Parade Executive Board. As founder of the political activist group Sisters for Obama, this organization helped win local and national campaigns. Zola as an organizer participated in the Rochester Labor Day Parade, Clarissa St. Reunion, and the Caribbean Parade.

Zola Brown's public commitments have earned her many honors. These include the 2012 Coalition of Black Trade Unionists Honor of Distinction, 2012 Women of Purpose Award, 2013 WDKX Women to Women Award, 2013 Workforce Development Women's Award, 2015 Mayor Lovely Warren proclaimed April 18th as Zola Brown Day in Rochester, and the Lena Grant Outstanding Community Award from ABC (Action For A Better Community).

Zola is also a poet. Her work has been published in "The Power of Purple: SEIU's Poetry Jam" collection.

Professionally Zola now heads the field operation of the 1199 SEIU National Benefit Fund. She also manages the union's Earned Income Tax Program in conjunction with the Creating Assets Savings & Hope (CASH) coalition led by the Empire Justice Center & the United Way.

Rapids Cemetery



19th Ward Spelling Bee Holds Annual Competition on April 21

The Eighth Annual 19th Ward Spelling Bee, a competition involving students from Rochester schools 10, 16, 19, 29, and 44, will be held **Saturday, April 21** in Hoyt Hall at the University of Rochester.

The Spelling Bee is free and open to the public.

The event is a partnership of the city of Rochester's 19th Ward Community Association, Rochester Area Community Foundation, the University of Rochester Admissions Office, Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity, the Rochester City School District, and the Arnett Branch Library. Students in grades 3 to 8 are encouraged to participate. **The Spelling Bee will start at 1 p.m. and end at about 3 p.m.**

The winners in each grade level are awarded a trophy, and a \$500 scholarship to be awarded when the student goes to college. A fund established at the Community Foundation supports the scholarships. This year, two winners from the first and second spelling bees graduated in the Spring and are in post-secondary education. Two more winners from the second and third spelling bees are on track to graduate this Spring.

The Spelling Bee was initiated by the neighborhood association, led at the time by President J.B. Afoh-Manin, along with Robin Carter-McFadden, Ken Maher, and Nick Robinson to recognize academic achievement in the neighborhood schools. Currently, the event is organized by the association's Schools Committee, chaired by John Laing.

Members of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity have taken a leadership role in hosting the Spelling Bee finalists by providing a tour of the UR campus and lunch, and conducting the competition. Practice sessions for participating students have been held since January at the Arnett Library and run by members of the fraternity and residents of the 19th Ward. The Rochester City School District provides transportation for the finalists to the event.

This program has grown from two schools in 2011 — John Walton Spencer School No. 16 and Lincoln Park School No. 44 — to five schools.

Delegates' Council Meeting, March 8, 2018

Harlan Ost, President, chaired the meeting

- **Arnett Library schedules multiple programs** for kids, teens and adults: For ages 12 and under, an arts and crafts program meets every Tuesday at 4:30. On Sat. April 7, at noon, New Life Fellowship Gospel Choir will perform as part of the Arnett Library Music Series. The Ar-Knit & Crochet Club will meet the 2nd and fourth Thursdays of each month at 5:30pm.
- Announcements: **Real2Reel Youth Film and Arts event** with Shawn Dunwoody asks young people to personalize Douglass' words, and reflect on "My Struggle, My Progress". Free event: Wed. April 4, 12:30pm, at MCC Downtown Campus.
- **Treasurer's Report** from Deb Wight: As of Feb. 28, 2018, we have in restricted funds \$14,872 and in available funds \$19,617.
- **Mike Kilc** described the new Listening Post project at Wilson HS. A room has been set aside for students and adult volunteers to gather at lunch time and talk informally about any topics. Mike has spoken with students about the history of the 19th Ward and he distributes copies of the U.S. Constitution. The program is expected to continue next year.
- **Taste of the Islands:** A tasting event is planned for 7pm, Friday, March 23, at Brue Coffee to showcase local Caribbean restaurants. Tickets available at the office or at the event.
- **Join us for the Palm Sunday breakfast, March 25 at 8am at Rochester Presbyterian.** Our speaker is Dana Miller and proceeds will benefit SWEM.
- **The 19th Ward Spelling Bee** will be held Sat. April 21, at 1pm at Hoyt Hall, Univ. of Rochester.
- **Rochester City-wide Tenants' Association** presentation: Ryan Acuff, Mary Brown and John Lindsey discussed the health and safety violations at 447 Thurston Road, a multi-family apartment building. These violations have included rodents, sewage, and doors without locks and have been well-documented in the press. The landlord has neglected to make necessary repairs, and the tenants have organized and called a press conference. The tenants have also started a rent strike, with legal help, as of March 1, 2018. The owner of the property is Thurston Road LLC, Peter Hungerford. Unfortunately, many tenants in Rochester face similar problems and there are few practical avenues to force landlords to make essential repairs. In response, the Delegates' Council adopted a motion in support of a City-wide Housing Court, good cause eviction protection and rent stabilization. See article in this newsletter for more information.
- The City is initiating **Rochester 2034**, a long term plan that will deal with land use regulation, development, future investment, and the allocation of critical resources. All residents are encouraged to answer the survey on the City's web site. The City is also seeking public input for its plans to improve the river front; see a second survey on that topic on the City's web site.
- The Delegates Council is recruiting new leadership for the **Public Safety Committee**, which does not have a chair,

19th Ward Community Association supports Tenants at 447 Thurston Road

Two tenants from 447 Thurston Road, Mary Brown and John Lindsey, attended the Delegates Council meeting on March 8 to explain why their tenants' association has circulated a petition, called a press conference and organized a rent strike as of March 1. Ms. Brown and Mr. Lindsey described multiple code violations that threaten the health and safety of those living in the building....violations including leaking sewage, electrical problems, falling ceilings, rodents and exterior doors without locks. The tenants reported that the conditions got worse when a new owner (Thurston Road LLC, and "Manager" Peter Hungerford) purchased the building in 2016.



Ryan Acuff from the City-Wide Tenant Union of Rochester also spoke at the Delegates' Council meeting. He noted that 60% of residents in Rochester are tenants, and they currently have no practical way of enforcing their right to safe and sanitary housing conditions. The City-Wide Tenant Association is calling for the establishment of a Housing Court, as part of the Rochester City Court. If a landlord is unwilling or unable to make required repairs, the tenants could petition the Housing Court for the appointment of a receiver, who would collect the rents and make repairs. Assemblyman Bronson and Senator Robach have introduced bills to create a Rochester Housing Court; see bills A 09783 and S 07809.

The City-Wide Tenant Union is also calling for good cause eviction protection; most tenants in Rochester currently rent on a month to month basis, and can be given a 30 day notice to vacate at any time and for any reason. A tenant who makes complaints about conditions risks being told to move. Finally, the group is advocating for the extension of Rent Stabilization so that communities upstate can decide to regulate rent increases. Rent stabilization regulations downstate cover certain buildings with six or more units.


The Delegates Council noted that banks that make mortgages to potential landlords for over-priced buildings are part of the problem. The Delegates Council voted to support NY legislation that would establish a Rochester Housing Court, that would provide good cause eviction protections and that would authorize local communities to enact rent stabilization protections.


